SIGNATURE EVENTS

STAR SPANGLED 4TH – JULY 4, 2018

10,200 attendees - Independence Day was celebrated at the spring training home of the Cleveland Indians and the Cincinnati Reds. This free event included live music, games, a hot dog eating contest and fireworks.

BALLET UNDER THE STARS – SEPTEMBER 14, 2018

4,500 attendees - Ballet Under the Stars is a free event that was held at the Estrella Lakeside Amphitheater. This event provided an opportunity for guests to enjoy classical and contemporary dance in a unique outdoor setting. Complete with a stage, lighting, and costumes, Ballet Under the Stars uses the starry night sky and community as a backdrop to expose a whole new generation to the beautiful art of ballet.

FALL FESTIVAL – OCTOBER 20, 2018

9,700 attendees - This free event included a costume contest, trick-or-treating, pumpkin patch, performances, and vendors selling their local treats. Kids and adults of all ages dressed up in their wicked or nice costumes.

VETERANS DAY TRIBUTE – NOVEMBER 11, 2018

650 attendees - The Veterans Day Tribute provides an opportunity for the public to show appreciation and support for the sacrifices made by American service members. This event includes a formal podium presentation, an interactive flag garden, and military displays.

HOME PLATE FOR THE HOLIDAYS – DECEMBER 1, 2018

6,000 attendees - This free, family-friendly event included the lighting of the Goodyear Christmas tree, performances by the Anderson Institute of Music, local vendors, stage performances, snow play area, pictures with Santa, and a variety of activities for children.

HEART & SOLE - FEBRUARY 3, 2018

800 attendees - The Heart & Sole 5K race featured a 1 Mile Family Fun Run/Walk. Beginning and ending at Goodyear Ballpark, the Heart & Sole 5K was a GREAT way to kick off National Heart Health Month. Vendors were on hand to help educate and show runners & walkers the best way to take care of themselves from head to toe.

CULTUREPOP – FEBRUARY 10, 2018

4,500 attendees - The cities of Avondale and Goodyear, in collaboration with Estrella Mountain Community College (EMCC), celebrated cultural unity by hosting the largest pop-up street festival in the Southwest Valley. CulturePOP Block party was free and open to the public and offered a fusion of arts, culture and entertainment. The celebration included a naturalization ceremony, Black History Month Community Celebration, and a variety of live performances.

GOODYEAR LAKESIDE MUSIC FEST – APRIL 7, 2018

7,500 attendees - In cooperation with the West Valley Arts Council and the Arts & Culture Commission, the City of Goodyear hosted a music festival that included multiple bands and solo artists who performed on multiple stages. The event was held at the Estrella Lakeside Amphitheater and provided hours of entertainment.

LIBRARY OPERATIONS

The Goodyear Branch Library, located in the Goodyear Municipal Complex on Van Buren Street, opened in January 2014. The 10,000 square foot facility was designed to be a gathering place for community members of all ages and houses more than 31,000 physical materials available for checkout in a variety of formats. The library has defined areas that include a children's area, dedicated space for teens, a bank of computers, and several workstations.

The library is one of 17 branches in the Maricopa County Library District, so customers have access to nearly 700,000 materials district-wide, plus access to more than 11.8 million downloadable books, movies, music, and magazines. The Goodyear Branch also provides access to several current magazines and newspapers including the Wall Street Journal and New York Times.

In FY18, the library expanded its hours to include Sundays. Patrons are now able to visit the Goodyear Branch Library seven days a week.

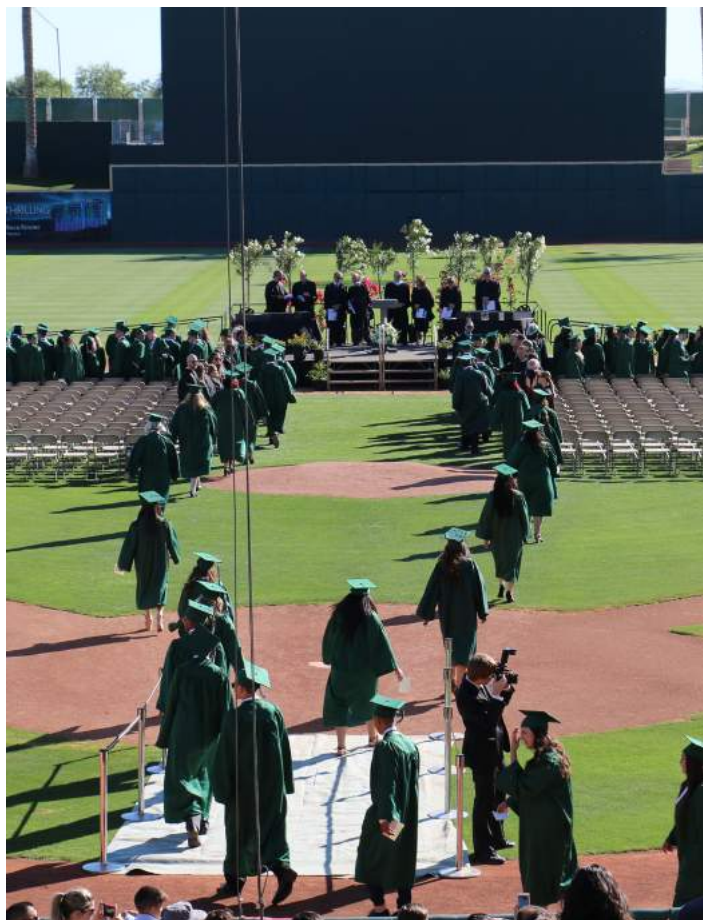

BALLPARK DIVISION

The 108-acre site is the spring training and year-round player development home of the Cleveland Indians and the Cincinnati Reds. The Goodyear Ballpark was constructed in 2009 on a 3-acre parcel south of Yuma Road and east of Estrella Parkway. The ballpark includes 8,000 stadium seats, 1,500 lawn seats, six luxury suites, terrace seating on the third level behind home plate, and more than 300 seats in the Right Field Pavilion. The development complex includes clubhouses, training facilities, and practice fields.

In addition to attracting more than 160,000 fans to Major League baseball, the facility also hosts more than 85 events annually including as regional and national baseball tournaments, city signature events, graduations, and festivals.

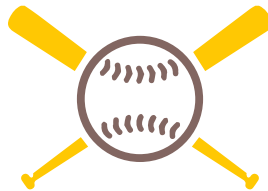

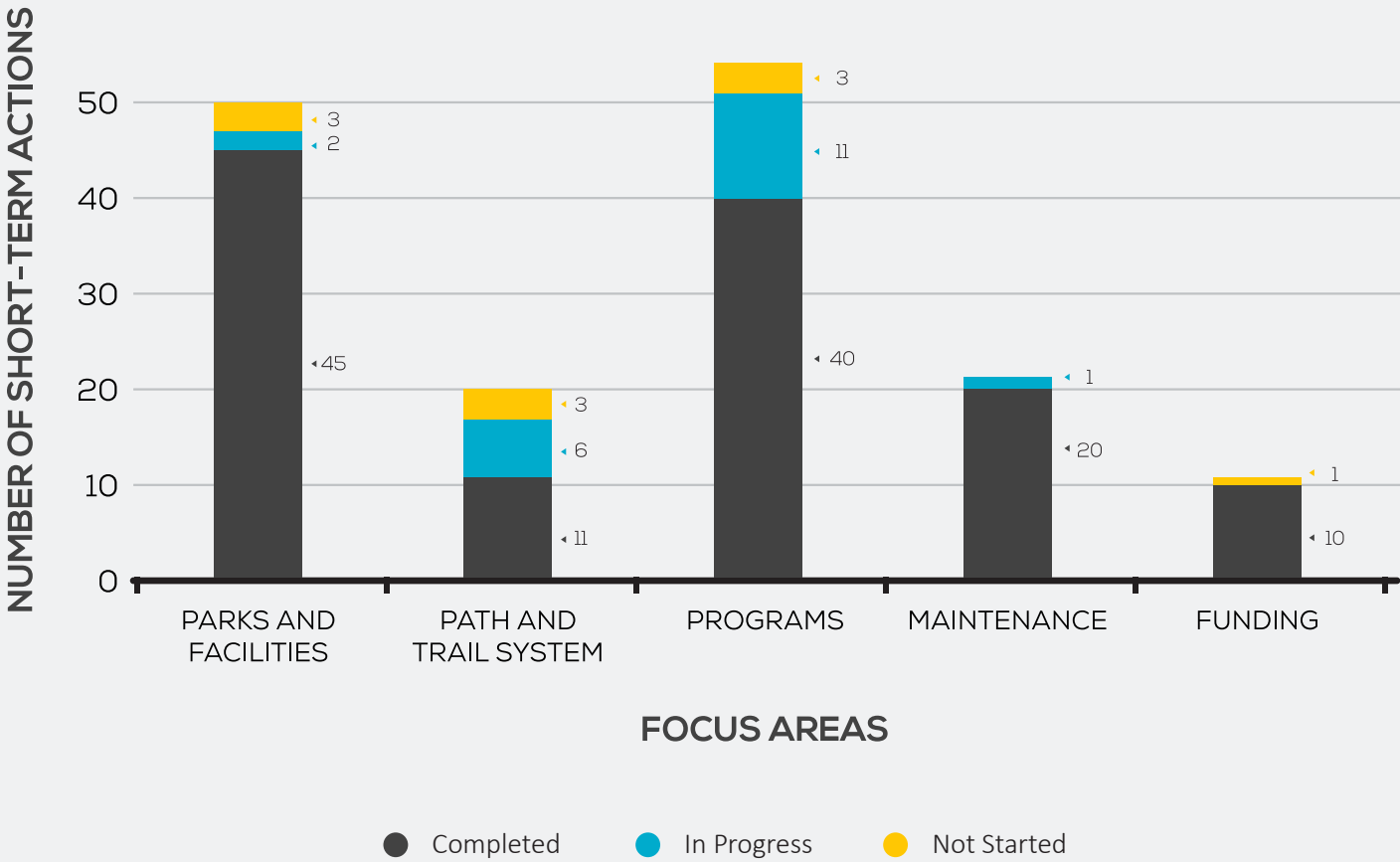


PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

The Parks & Recreation Trails and Open Space Master Plan was adopted in 2014 and identified 156 short-term action items. Of the short-term actions, 126 (81%) have been completed, 20 (13%) are in progress, and 10 (6%) have not been started.

LOOKING FORWARD

RECREATION CAMPUS

Planning for the future Recreation Campus began in August of 2017 with the selection of Kimley-Horn to provide master planning services for the project. The Recreation Campus Master Plan encompasses the entire 86-acre site and is consistent with the recommendations in the current Parks, Recreation, Trails, and Open Space Master Plan. The Recreation Campus includes a 30-acre community park, a recreation center, and an aquatics facility on the eastern portion of the site (40-acres). The remaining 46-acres will include future regional park amenities.



A comprehensive community outreach process was a primary focus of the master planning effort. Multiple inputs from a variety of sources were utilized to ensure that the ideas, needs, and desires of the community were reflected in the Recreation Campus Master Plan.

- + Inputs included:
 - Public outreach
 - City Council interviews
 - 2014 Parks, Recreation, Trails, and Open Space Master Plan
 - 2025 General Plan
 - Stakeholder sessions (HOA meetings, park user groups, Basis, Desert Edge High School)
 - City commissions (Parks & Recreation Advisory Commission, Arts & Culture Commission, Youth Commission)
 - City core team comprised of representatives from city departments
- + In all, more than 1,100 participants were engaged in the community outreach process. The information collected was prioritized and incorporated into three initial concepts. These concepts were presented to the public and their input helped to formulate the final concept.
